A big thank you to all the employers, speakers, and organisers who made the day so informative and inspiring!






# Proud Table

which was reminiscent of a skate park but crafted from snow! Here, students demonstrated skilful ability while completing these jumps safely.




# Electives

## Girls STEM

In the UK, women currently hold about 24% of STEM jobs, despite making up almost half of the overall workforce. This figure highlights persistent underrepresentation, especially in engineering and technology. Companies are missing out – those with a better gender balance are generally more profitable due to having diverse perspectives, which drive creativity and problem-solving.

Companies across the UK struggle to recruit into many STEM jobs due to a lack of suitable applicants. This could be eased considerably if more women considered following this career, but research shows that, by the age of 12, most girls are of the opinion that a STEM career is “not for someone like me” – due, among other things, to societal and parental influences and a lack of role models.

The Girls’ STEM elective seeks to play a small part in swinging the pendulum back. Run by Mr Hobbs, with 15 years’ experience in industry, girls from Year 7 to 11 are given the opportunity to explore the world of STEM in a variety of ways. These include hands-on activities – flying a plane furthest, finding nematode worms in moss, dissecting locusts, building bridges and towers out of newspaper, experimenting with maggots, programming a micro:bit computer and running a production line – alongside researching possible careers and women who are already in the industry.



# Electives

## Music Aptitude

This term, our aptitude musicians have been getting stuck into preparing for a mock audition to help them feel ready for real-life musical experiences. While the audition itself was “fake”, the skills they’ve been building are very real and incredibly valuable.

Each student chose a solo piece to work on, focusing on playing with confidence, musicality, and personality. They also practised their scales and were encouraged to think about who they are as musicians and what inspires them.

As part of the audition, students answered questions about their musical passions, influences, and their instrument and performed their chosen piece.

Students have learned how to handle nerves, take feedback on board, and present themselves positively.

Overall, the experience has been a great confidence boost and an excellent step towards preparing them for the real musical world ahead.

# English

Although a short term, life in English has been extremely busy.

Year 7 have been exploring inclusion and diversity through the short story 'Answers in the pages' which they will also continue up to Easter.

Year 8 have been looking at the concept of heroes - what is it to be one in real and fictional life.

Year 9 have focused on extracts to do with time. What is time? Is time travel possible? They have also had the opportunity to produce a piece of creative writing based around the subject.

Year 10 are well into their GCSE experience having already studied two of our key Literature texts. They have also studied for Language Paper 1 Section A and have now moved onto Power and Conflict Poetry which they will continue up to Easter.

Year 12 Language and Literature students have been settling well into their courses and are demonstrating a passion for the subjects that we know will continue to Year 13 and beyond.

Year 11 and 13 have completed their Language and Literature content and are now being given the time for structured retrieval and revision so that the key skills are embedded before their March trial exams and their final exams in May/June.

To support with this, Year 11 have also been involved in workshops to explore Macbeth using a more active style of the rehearsal room with an RSC actor Emma Manton. Further to this, they have been to the Derngate Theatre to watch some of the key poets from the Power and Conflict section of Literature Paper 2 - hearing their voices rather than just studying in the classroom is an incredible opportunity.

As you can see, our curriculum gives an opportunity for our students to explore the British values of Democracy, The Rule of Law, Individual Liberty, Mutual Respect, and Tolerance.

And a massive well done to all our students for embracing the challenge and showcasing their creativity. We're so proud of what you've achieved.




# Science

## STEM Day

On Friday 6th February, KC was delighted to host a STEM Day for three local primary schools. Around 40 pupils visited our science labs to experience hands-on practical work in biology, chemistry and physics, giving them a taste of what science lessons are like in secondary school.

In chemistry, pupils carried out flame tests to observe the range of colours produced by different metals. They also enjoyed the ever-popular methane bubble demonstration, in which Mrs Edwards was set on fire!



In biology, pupils tested “space food” samples to discover whether they contained sugars, starch, proteins or lipids. This introduced them to key biological testing methods and sparked great curiosity about what is in our food. Students also had the opportunity to use microscopes to see objects too small to see with the naked eye. They drew some amazing scientific diagrams of cells, which resulted in one person being picked by two of our sixth formers to win the prize for best drawing.

For physics, students built their own spectoscopes, learning how light can be split into different colours. A special thank you goes to our Year 13 student, Ion, who confidently led this activity and knowledgeably explained the science behind what students were seeing.

The day was full of enthusiasm, questions and discovery. It was wonderful to see so many young students engaged in science and enjoying practical experiments in a real laboratory setting. This would not have been possible without the help of our amazing sixth formers helpers so thank you to Ion, Cadence, Hollie, Antonio, Kia and Jamie for being brilliant role models and representatives of KC.





## International Day of Women and Girls in Science

On Wednesday 11th February, the science department celebrated the International Day of Women and Girls in Science by highlighting the achievements of female scientists.

All year groups began their science lessons with a through the door task about Katalin Karikó or Anne McLaren. Students read about their work, answered questions, and discussed the impact of their contributions to science and medicine.

The activities helped students appreciate the important role women play in STEM and encouraged them to think about the value of diversity in science. Hopefully this inspired students to consider how STEM careers are possible regardless of gender, race or background.

## Modern Foreign Languages

### Year 11 Mock Speaking Exams

Year 11 French & German students have just completed their mock speaking exams; and it was clear that many of them had been working really hard in order to do the best they could.

Although it is natural to be nervous about an exam which involves speaking in a foreign language, a lot of the students had taken the mock seriously as it is the only practice before the real exam at the end of April.

Intervention in German continues to run on a Tuesday & Friday after school, with French taking place Wednesday lunchtimes; but if you can't make it then talk to your teacher to see how they can support you over the next few months.

# PSHE: Supporting Your Child in RSE (Relationships & Sex Education)

As part of our commitment to high-quality RSE, we know that parents and carers play a vital role in supporting learning and open conversations at home.

## Why RSE matters:

RSE helps young people develop the knowledge, skills and confidence to build healthy relationships, understand their bodies and make safe, informed choices as they grow up. This includes learning about respect, consent, online safety, emotional wellbeing, and how to navigate friendships and romantic relationships.

## How you can support your child:

- **Stay informed about the curriculum** - Schools are required to teach RSE topics that are age-appropriate and evidence-based. Regular communication about what will be covered helps you prepare and support your child at home.
- **Encourage open dialogue** - Honest, calm conversations make it easier for children to ask questions and share concerns. You don't need to have all the answers — just showing you're open makes a big difference.
- **Use reliable resources** - Brook is a UK charity that offers practical advice, FAQs and free resources specifically for parents and carers to help you navigate RSE topics with confidence. (Explore Brook's Parent & Carer Support Online: <https://www.brook.org.uk/parents-and-carers/>)

## Tips for home:

- Set aside “little and often” conversation moments rather than one big talk — this keeps topics natural and comfortable.
- Be prepared to explore your own values and listen first — this helps your child feel understood and respected.
- Ask what your child already knows before diving in — this helps you tailor responses to their age and understanding.

The session explored the impact of alcohol and drug abuse on individuals, families, and the wider community, encouraging reflection, discussion, and informed decision-making.



We learn more about the past, we empathise with others today, and we take action for a better future.

# Inclusion

This term, the Inclusion Department, alongside our exceptional SEND students, has focused on creating engaging PowerPoint presentations and artworks of National Events, Awareness Days and their hobbies and interests. Our students have used creative skills while exploring topics such as Valentines Day, Random Acts of Kindness, Epilepsy Day and The World Cup 2026. Our students have not only expanded their knowledge but also gained a deeper understanding of their own passions and interests.

**Epilepsy how is it caused?**

**Genetic Factors:** Inherited gene changes or new mutations can increase risk.

**Brain injury/ trauma:** Head Injuries from accidents, strokes or infections like meningitis.

**Brain Structure Issues :** Congenital abnormalities, tumours or abnormal blood vessel formation (AVMs)

**What to do if someone is having a seizure**

- Stay with the person: until they recover and help arrives.
- Guide them gently: away from danger if needed.
- Note the seizure's duration.
- Place them in the recovery position: (on their side) after the seizure, if appropriate, to help with breathing.
- Don't crowd them: or interfere unnecessarily.

## Girl-guiding




## Literacy Ambassadors

- Universal Credit (Income Related)

Children who receive these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get free school meals.
