



## Year 7 Catch Up Premium

The literacy and numeracy catch-up premium gives schools additional funding to support Year 7 pupils who did not achieve the expected standard in reading or maths at the end of Key Stage 2. This funding equates to £500 for each Year 7 pupil.

The funding is used by Kingsthorpe College to deliver additional tuition or intensive support in small groups, giving pupils valuable support to bring them up to speed so that they are more likely to succeed whilst with us. The Government expects the funding to be used for additional literacy and numeracy catch-up during Year 7 given that this can make a critical difference to pupils at this important stage. The key aim of our programme is to get all students to at least the expected attainment as others during or by the end of Y7.

As a school, we use the Question Level Analysis (QLA) from year 7 identified students' primary school which gives a breakdown of individual students' performance in each question and element of the three Key Stage 2 tests:

- Mathematics
- Reading
- Grammar, punctuation and spelling

## 2018-2019

On entry to Year 7 in the academic year 2018 -2019, we had 78 students (33.05%) who had not achieved the national standard of a scaled score of 100 in Maths; 84 students who had not achieved the national standard of a scaled score of 100 in English (35.59%) and 54 students (22.88%) who had not achieved the expected national standard in either Maths or English.

The College used the £36,931 which it received to ensure maximum progression towards securing the national standard and to use a personalised approach to support every child in their own specific needs and a modern curriculum approach that maximised impact.

## <u>2019-2020</u>

For the academic year 2019-2020, the College will receive approximately £40,000 in funding. On entry to Year 7 in the academic year 2019 – 2020, we have 14 students (5.8%) who have not achieved the national standard of a scaled score of 100 in Maths; 26 students who have

not achieved the national standard of a scaled score of 100 in English (10.4%) and 42 students (17.5%) who have not achieved the national standard in either Maths or English.

The College will use the Catch Up Fund to support identified students using small group interventions to help support their learning. Strategies that will be used include:

- Provision of Higher-Level Teaching Assistant (HLTA) support in English to work with identified students on basic Literacy Progress units.
- Personalised catch up sessions for identified students in English and Maths in addition to their normal lessons.
- Specialist Learning Support Assistant (LSA) working with identified students on a Phonics teaching programme for identified students in English.
- Summer School provision for identified students with a numeracy/literacy focus with impact measurable outcomes.
- Intensive small-group tuition.
- Use of Accelerated Reader to support improvements in literacy.
- Increased testing to measure impact of associated interventions and progress.
- Regular monitoring of student progress to assess progress of the Catch Up provision.
- Regular monitoring of student involvement in extra-curricular activities.
- Regular monitoring of students' Attitude to Learning.
- Regular monitoring of student welfare and parental engagement via Student and Parent Voice.
- Regular monitoring of student attendance to enable early identification and intervention with students whose attendance drops below 95%.
